Thankful Recipients who Delight in the Church

The Church is not an ideal, but a reality, and so the way in which we enter that reality makes all the difference.

Bonhoeffer: Someone who loves their dream of a community more than the Christian community itself becomes a destroyer of the Christian community, even if their intentions are honest and earnest and sacrificial.

Care, Love, and Commitment

Some of the ways God calls us to actively care and love one another:

- Honor one another above yourselves. (Rom 12:10)
- Love one another just as Christ has loved us (John 12:34)
- Bear one another's burdens (Gal. 6:2)
- Be kind and compassionate to one another (Ephesians 4:32)
- Forgiving each other (Eph. 4:32)
- In humility counting each other more significant than yourselves." (Phil. 2:3)
- Encourage one another. (1 Thess. 4:18)
- Always strive to do good to one another (5:15)
- Outdo one another in showing honor (Rom. 12:10)
- Consider how to stir up one another to love and good deeds (Heb. 10:24)
- Confess your sins to one another and pray for one another... (James 5:16)
- Show hospitality to one another without grumbling. (1 Peter 4:9)...

"The human body has many parts, but the many parts make up one whole body. So it is with the body of Christ.... all have been baptized into one body by one Spirit, and we all share the same Spirit. Yes, the body has many different parts, not just one part. If the foot says, "I am not a part of the body because I am not a hand," that does not make it any less a part of the body... But our bodies have many parts, and God has put each part just where he wants it. How strange a body would be if it had only one part! Yes, there are many parts, but only one body. - 2. In what ways is your church strong at welcoming outsiders? Where could it improve? (Adapted from Love Your Church by Tony Merida)
- 3. Ray Ortlund (whose Welcome Pastor Colton referred to in his message) and Sam Allberry point out how our understanding of the gospel (our gospel doctrine), creates a gospel culture. They say that knowing how we enter into fellowship together should profoundly shape the culture of our church. In what ways does Christ's sacrifice for us set the tone for our fellowship together?
- 4. Pastor Colton offered a brief list of some of the ways we are called to love and care for one another in the church. Go through the list and discuss what this would practically look like to be engaged in: a) on a Sunday morning, and b) throughout the week.
- 5. Do you view your church community as a place where you can exhale after a long hard week and enjoy the community (or rather, family!) with honesty and trust and genuine affection or is coming to church a place where you feel like you have to put your best foot forward, and grin your way through while you are actually stressed out and wanting to crawl into a cave. Why or why not?
