Thinking Christianly Part Six: Beauty

I. God the Artist

“The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands. Day after day they pour forth speech; night after night they reveal knowledge. They have no speech; night after night they reveal knowledge. They have no speech; they use no words; no sound is heard from them. Yet their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world.”

II. Art as a Means of Truth-Telling

III. The Creative Endeavor

And we are called, as humans, as those who bear the image of the Creator God, into the important work of ‘creating’ and expressing the truth in creative ways.

Interestingly, many of the greatest scientific breakthroughs originated through the highly imaginative bringing together of seemingly unrelated things. When Albert Einstein considered his theories of relativity, he famously thought about trains and light beams. He said, in an interview about his intuition:

“I am enough of the artist to draw freely upon my imagination. Imagination is more important than knowledge. Knowledge is limited. Imagination encircles the world.”

Life Group Discussion and Reflection Questions

Open Up:

Describe a time when you had an experience of beauty – in the natural world, or through a human artwork – that moved you deeply. Why was that so meaningful to you?

Dig In:

1. **Read Psalm 19.** In what ways have you experienced the glories of God through the skies?
2. The first portion of the Psalm speaks of God’s words through the natural world and the second about God’s words through the “law”, or God’s instructions through Scripture. Why do you think we need both?

3. Read and discuss the following

4. The Psalms offer a guide for our own prayer life, using poetic imagery and language to speak to our often-messy lives and to bring God back into the centre of it. What would it look like for you to make a regular habit of praying through the Psalms?
